

This section shows a detailed view of the title page and abstract section of an APA 6th Edition paper.

Title Page (Page 1):

- Running head: PRAYER PROFESSIONAL COUNSELING
- Note: The prefix "Running head:" before the shortened title is **only** used on the title page.
- Using Prayer in Professional Counseling

- Author's Note is **only** used for publication.

Abstract (Page 2):

- Abstract heading is **not bold**; it is centered at top of page 2.
- Because religion or spirituality is important to many people, mental health workers need to be aware of the issues surrounding each so that they can better serve their clients. Prayer plays a large part in the lives of many people and can be a part of their therapy. Licensed mental health professionals need to be aware of the ethical guidelines surrounding these issues. Also, they should be educated in when and how to incorporate spiritual treatment methods into therapy and then strive to remain updated on these topics.
- The Abstract is typically between 150-250 words, depending upon the paper requirements. It should be an accurate, concise, objective, and specific summary of the whole paper without evaluation or opinion.

Using Prayer in Professional Counseling

Everyday, prayer is used in homes, workplaces, and schools across the world, but is it appropriate to use prayer in counseling? Those who simply claim to be spiritual, use prayer as a means to find peace, or people use prayer as a means to find relief from their anger (Grob, 2001, p. 15). For those dealing with emotional problems, 42% first turn to clergy rather than counselors or psychologists (p. 49). 4. The prayer was used closer together.

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Use the ampersand "&" symbol for multiple authors listed in references and citations.

If different Authors have the same Last Name and First Initial, provide their First Names in brackets. E.g., Smith, J. [John] and Smith, J. [Jane].

List references alphabetically by Author's Last Name, First Initial, and Year of Publication.
